Dominicans and modernity

On December 4, the Acton Institute and its Rome office concluded another successful international conference, Freedom, Virtue and the Good Society: The Dominican Contribution. The 380-person overflow crowd at the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas included participants from the Angelicum itself and other pontifical universities, various religious and missionary orders, diverse sectors of business, non-profits and political leadership, as well as representatives from diplomatic corps to the Holy See.

Promoted as a "sequel" to the November 2017 conference on the Jesuit contribution to building up a free and just globalized world, this conference focused on the specifically Dominican tradition in sustaining a freer, virtuous and just society.

Speakers included Sr. Catherine Joseph Droste, O.P., vice dean of theology at the Angelicum; Fr. Martin Rhonheimer, president of the Austrian Institute of Economics and Social Philosophy; Jay Richards, research professor at the Catholic University of America's Busch School of Business; and others.

Acton's Samuel Gregg gave the afternoon's final lecture, titled "Henri-Dominque Lacordaire: A Dominican Faces Modernity," in which much of the moral discussion of a free and just society centered not on how politicians or business persons can be corrupted or corrected, but on how the Church's clergy and institutions may become run afoul of the Church's moral mission – or at least forced to sacrifice some sovereignty and religious freedom to the state.

It was a persistent, incorrigible Henri-Dominque Lacordaire who re-established the Dominican order in post-revolutionary France. He wanted the Church to be completely free of the "strings attached" to state contributions, which compromised their liberty to fully teach, preach or act as they wanted.

UK to investigate global Christian persecution

On the day after Christmas, the British government launched a review of Christian persecution in "key countries" – especially in the Middle East, Asia and Africa – to seek ways the UK can help those who are suffering.

Christianity is on the "verge of extinction in its birthplace," said Foreign Secretary Jeremy Hunt, who ordered the report. "So often the persecution of Christians is a telling early warning sign of the persecution of every minority."

Bishop Philip Mounstephen, the Anglican bishop of Truro, will lead the effort to uncover "the scale of the problem" and "offer ambitious policy recommendations" to the government. The report is scheduled to be completed by Easter

A second report on Christian persecution conducted by the international monitoring group Open Doors confirmed that economic liberty and religious liberty are correlated. It named North Korea as the most repressive anti-Christian nation in the world. The worst offenders also have a low regard for property rights as measured by the Fraser Institute's Economic Freedom Report, which ranks nations from one to 162.

The UK government, and all Christians, must recognize the inherent link between freedom of conscience and the right to own property in a free economy.

Yellow vest protests: the uprising of a generation

The rise of the *gilets jaunes* rioters in France took many people by surprise. President Emmanuel Macron has caved in to the rioters' demands and offered other policy concessions to try to mollify them. By doing so he is exacerbating the problems that led people to take to the streets. His actions will certainly not resolve France's underlying economic problems.

During the week of December 10, an estimated 130,000 people took part in the riots. Police arrested more than 1,700 people. Officials said that 264 people were injured, including 39 police and gendarmes and several journalists. These riots are serious events and the concern must be that they are the beginning of a trend. High fuel costs, high taxes and the high cost of living were the main factors behind the rioting. However, high levels of unemployment (in part caused by extraordinarily high taxes on low-paid labor) was also to blame.

Arguably, we are beginning to see the results of the disastrous decisions to set up pay-as-you-go pension and healthcare systems after the Second World War. Instead of each generation building up savings to provide for the expenses of old age, the taxes of the working generation pay for the pensions and healthcare of the retired generation in these unsustainable systems.

State pension schemes run on a pay-as-you-go basis are often known as "social solidarity" schemes, especially in France. This is a terrible misnomer. The mechanism by which a given generation of workers votes themselves pension and health benefits, expecting the next generation to pay for them, seems designed to create social conflict.

Christians should speak out against the injustice of generations promising themselves benefits to be paid for by other future generations – indeed, they should have spoken out 30 years ago. The current systems of welfare provision are unsustainable, unjust and may well lead to the breakdown of civil society and an increased tendency of young people to turn to violence to get what they regard as just restitution.

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


Flourishing Faith: A Baptist Primer




On Islam
